Club gaming permits allow the provision of no more than 3 gaming machines. These may be categories B3A, B4, C or D but only 1 B3A machine can be sited as part of this entitlement.
2.4.2 Club Gaming & Club Machine Permit	If a club does not wish to have the full range of facilities permitted by a club gaming permit or if they are commercial club not permitted to provide non-machine gaming (other then exempt gaming under section 269 of the Act), they may apply for a club machine permit, which will enable the premises to provide gaming machines (3 machines of categories B4, C or D).
