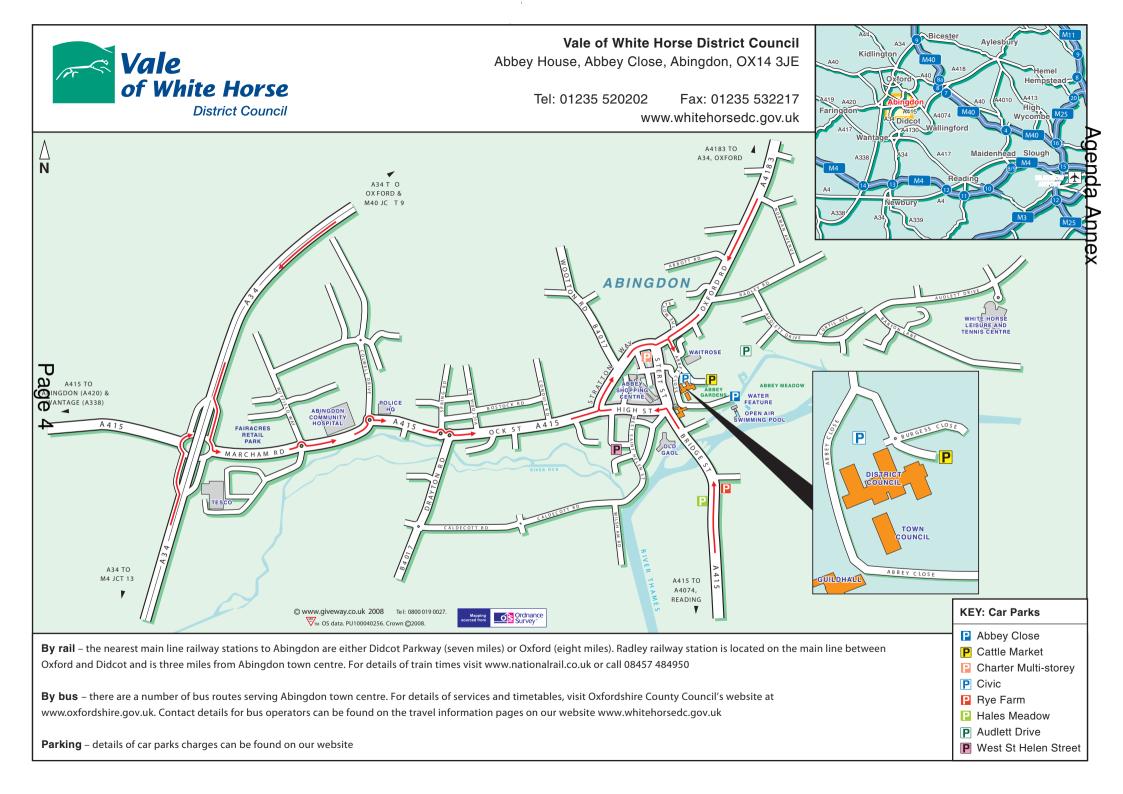

Ab.14 Statements, petitions and questions from the public affecting the Abingdon Area Committee

The committee received three statements from the public relating to grant applications as follows:

- (1) Mr Malcolm Ross spoke on behalf of Abingdon Performing Arts Group Enterprise, known as APAGE, thanking the committee for the opportunity to speak. He welcomed the proposed service level agreement and the new relationship it would bring with the District Council. He stated that this was more important than the grant itself. He reported that he was well aware of the conditions included in the agreement and understood that it was not a contract. An Service Level agreement would mean that not only had APAGE secured psychological support but also a steady influx of funds.
- (2) Mr Steve Beacon spoke on behalf of the Abingdon Rugby Club. He highlighted the positive impact that the club had on Abingdon. He reported that the Club had been founded in 1931 and had in excess of 400 members, but it was hoped that this would increase to over 500 by 2013. At the same time the Club aimed to increase the number of volunteers. He stated that funding for the new rugby pitch had been secured and the Club was requesting a grant towards the pitch lighting.
- (3) Sue Hargreeves spoke in support of Abingdon Sea Cadets. She explained that the Sea Cadets were applying for a grant to replace their boat trailer, which was damaged



in the recent floods in 2007. A new trailer would mean the Sea Cadets could reintroduce teaching of power boating skills during the summer months. Amongst the Abingdon membership, there were currently cadets with special educational needs.

The Chair thanked the speakers for their statements explaining that they would be taken into account when the committee considered the respective applications later in the meeting.

Ab.15 Community Grants

The committee received and considered report 68/09 of the Head of Community Strategy, which set out details of three applications for community grants and two requests for twinning grants. The report also set out the committee's community grants budget position. It was noted that £10,830 remained in the current financial year. However, the committee noted that its available budget could be increased in that the grants awarded by the Committee on 6 November 2008 to the Compass Café and the Vale of White Horse Foyer had not been claimed. However, both applicants might not need to claim these grants if their applications for third party funding to the County Council's Chill Out Fund were unsuccessful.

Councillors noted that there was insufficient funding available to award all the grants requested. Councillors concluded that each application should be considered on its own merits and decided to have no regard to the possible additional funding from the Chill Out Fund. In the first instance, the committee considered whether to support the application in principle. The Committee would then revisit each application and vote on amounts to be awarded.

(1) Abingdon Town Council Twining

Councillor Tony de Vere took the Chair for this item

(Councillors Julie Mayhew-Archer, Jim Halliday, Angela Lawrence, Pat Lonergan and Alison Rooke had each declared a personal and prejudicial interest in this item and left the room during its consideration).

Councillors considered the budget provision for this financial year and considered reducing the amount awarded to Abingdon Town Council for twinning purposes. It was reported that a large part of the grant would be used to fund the staff post.

(2) Drayton Twinning Society

(Councillor Richard Webber declared a personal and prejudicial interest in this item and left the room in during its consideration).

Whilst considering each application on its own merits, Councillors commented that it would be fair if the grant to Drayton Twinning Society was reduced by the same percentage as that to Abingdon Town Council. It was reported that the Society was independent of the Parish Council and was run entirely by volunteers. It was commented that the Society ran on a two year cycle, one year was spent visiting the other twin town and the other spent hosting. This resulted in significant variations in the budget each year. The Committee was reluctant to decrease the grant mid-term as the twinning society was expecting the same level of funding and had budgeted for this. The Committee considered that the full amount requested should be awarded on this occasion but the Society should be informed that the amount could be reduced next year.



(3) APAGE (Abingdon Performing Arts Group Enterprise)

(Councillors Tony de Vere, Jim Halliday, Julie Mayhew-Archer, Alison Rooke, Laurel Symons and Richard Webber each declared a personal interest in this item).

At the last meeting of the Abingdon Area Committee members resolved to support, in principle, a three year Service Level Agreement (SLA) with APAGE to support the Abingdon Arts Festival. This would give APAGE regular funding and avoid the need for the organisation to submit a fresh grant application each year. Councillors commented that an agreement was not a contract, the agreement could be terminated by giving APAGE six months' notice and the amount could be reduced from one year to the next depending on the Councils budget. Councillors thought this was the best arrangement for both APAGE and the Council. The Committee agreed to award £2,750 to APAGE as part of the agreement. However if additional funds became available through grants, the authority was delegated to increase this amount to £3,000.

(4) Abingdon Sea Cadets

(Councillor Jim Halliday had declared a personal interest in this item).

Councillors asked if the Sea Cadets received any funding from the Ministry of Defence or the Navy as it had been reported that similar organisations had received funding in the past. It was reported that the Sea Cadets did not receive any further funding and were entirely self sufficient. Councillors commented that £1,000 was a significant sum for the Sea Cadets who had raised substantial funds themselves. Councillors noted that the Sea Cadets supported a lot of children and people with disabilities. As the Sea Cadets accommodated pupils from South Oxfordshire then it was suggested that the organisation should apply to that district council for grant funding also. The Committee decided to award the grant requested.

(5) Abingdon Rugby Club

(Councillor Jim Halliday had declared a personal interest in this item).

Members spoke highly of the Rugby Club and remarked on the high number of users. As the work at the club was nearly complete it was suggested that it would be beneficial for the Rugby Club to submit an invoice for the work, thus lowering the VAT payable before the VAT was raised again in January 2010.

Community Grants

Recommendations

Purpose of report

1. The purpose of this report is to set out the budget position for the Abingdon Area Committee in respect of community grants, to invite the committee to consider and determine grant applications.

Relationship with Corporate Plan

2. The award of grants to community and voluntary sector groups helps to deliver actions set out in the Vale's Sustainable Community Strategy, which aims to improve the quality of life for everyone in the Vale.



Report No. 121/10

The community grants budget

- 3. The total budget for community grants for 2011/12 for the Vale is £103,400. This budget is apportioned between the Executive and four area committees. The Executive receives 20% of the budget and the remainder (£82,720) is apportioned according to the electorate in each area on 1 January 2011. The electorate in the Abingdon area on 1 January was 29,900, 31.90% of the Vale's electorate Therefore the budget position for community grants for 2011/12 for the Abingdon area of the Vale is £26,391.
- 4. At its meeting on 7 January 2011 the Executive invited the area committees to meet no more than twice a year, in early April and early October. Therefore, if sufficient budget remains unallocated at the end of this meeting, the area committee will meet again in early October.

New grant applications

- 5. Applications totalling £50,690 have been received from the applicants listed below. Precises providing additional details are in the appendix to this report.
- 6. Officers have used a scoring system to help in evaluating each application. The scoring system is a fair and transparent way of evaluating how closely a project supports corporate and community strategy priorities, the local need and the amount of funding requested as a percentage of project cost.
- 7. In making the following recommendations officers have also taken into account the available budget. If the following recommendations are approved without amendment the total grant awarded will be £23,226.

This project shows a major contribution to the Vale Community Strategy and the Vale's Corporate Priorities. However the application could be improved by further evidence of community consultation and actual evidence of local need. Planning permission was granted in October 2007 but this expires in October 2010. The estimate of costs is not dated or signed and it is unlikely that a building of this type would be constructed for the £200,000 quoted. It is suggested that the grant award be used towards professional fees for advice regarding consultation, fundraising, legal and architectural design/costs.

As at 31/5/10 the boxing club has cash in hand of £16,111. A new charity has been established to hold the funds for the new building but no details of this organisation have been submitted. This should also be a condition of the grant. It is also recommended that the Boxing Club seek advice from OCVA regarding funding and constitutional review.

Grants Officer:

The Nasio Trust's 'Operation Exit 7' looks to engage disadvantaged young people in the district by engaging them in a number of activities. The project has applied for funding towards the following activities:

- High Ropes team building session
- Football Pitch Hire 6 months at Tilsley Park
- Team building weekend at the Lake District
- Awareness Workshop
- and associated costs incurred with these activities.

Each year the organisation has made a surplus. Last year they did make a loss of £34,475. This was a result of a large capital project building a new day care centre for HIV orphans in Kenya. This project was planned for a number of years and used surpluses from previous accounting years. At December 2010 the organisation currently holds £33,886 in reserves.

The Trust has applied to Abingdon Town Council for financial support of £675 towards working with young people in the town centre and in South Abingdon. They will not know of a decision until late May 2011.

Has this organisation previously received funding?

No previous funding awarded.

Young People's Co-ordinator Comments:

I have been working with the Nasio Trust to develop links with young people and agencies in Abingdon and have attended some of the meetings.

They have recruited a good and diverse range of young people who are committed to this project. I have been impressed with their dedication and the way they are engaging disadvantaged young people from several agencies in Abingdon (Bridge, NET, Foyer).

I am confident this project will have the same positive outcomes as Berinsfield of empowering young people who are facing severe disadvantage such as being homeless, NEET, ex offenders or at risk of offending and give them the chance to participate in a project that not only involves them in their local community but helps them to understand issues of oppression and disadvantage in other parts of the world, by supporting through fundraising HIV orphans in Kenya. This gives them a sense of achievement and builds their confidence and self esteem and helps to develop their sense of self worth and how they can make a positive impact on their community. It also gives them a goal to work towards and incentive to stay out of trouble. I fully support the grant application for this project.
