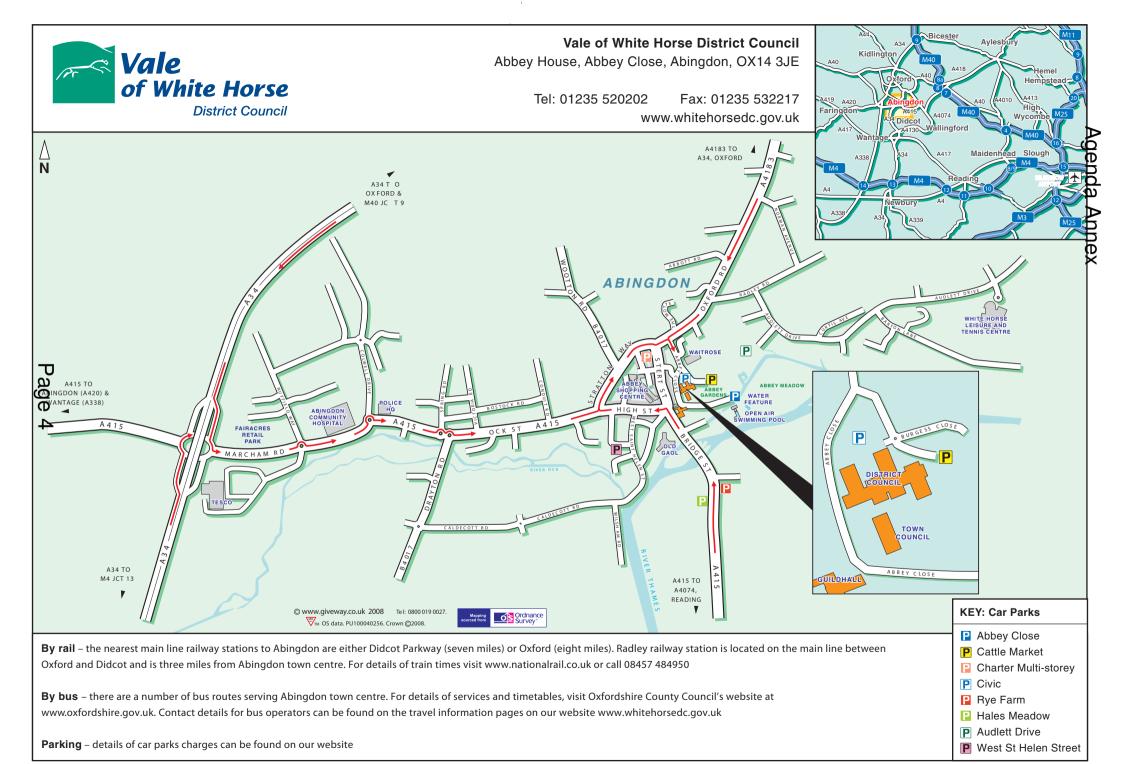

#### SE.13 Urgent business and Chairman's announcements

The chair raised the matter of the Executive reducing the committee's grants budget and the cancellation of the March 2010 committee meeting. It was also reported that any funds that were not spent in the financial year would be returned to the councils' general funds and should not be carried forward to the forthcoming financial year. Members expressed concern about these changes. It was noted that the council' standing orders allowed the committee to call for a further meeting if needed.

### SE.14 Statement, petitions and questions from the public relating to matters affecting the south east area committee

The committee received two statements from member of the public under standing order 32 both concerning community grant applications as follows: -

- (1) Mr Steve West spoke on behalf of the Wantage and Grove Street Pastors initiative. He highlighted the work and benefits to the community of the Pastors initiative around the town of Wantage in the evenings. He explained that at other locations across the country the presence of street pastors had been shown to have a significant and positive effect on the atmosphere of the town and cities as well as providing help and reassurance where needed. He commented that the street pastors were all volunteers. He explained that the pastors would initially be able to provide support and care on Friday nights but hoped that the scheme could be extended to Saturdays and to Grove in the future. He commented that the scheme was seeking funding towards the cost of providing administrative support to the volunteers and equipment such as uniforms and mobile telephones. He drew attention to some examples where the pastor's intervention had had a positive effect.
- Mr James Mitchell spoke on behalf of the Wantage Betjeman Festival of Literature and Poetry. He explained that the organising committee planned to use the festival to encourage greater interest in poetry and literature especially amongst young children and young people and to raise the cultural heritage and history of Wantage. The festival was planned to take place over a ten day period in September 2011 and would include many performers from both leading national celebrities and local

amateur organisations. He highlighted the Hay on Wye festival as an example of the type of event that he would like to aspire to provide. He produced professional sketches from an artist which were to be used as a logo for the festival. The festival would include an extensive educational outreach program that would benefit an area 10 miles around Wantage.

The chair thanked the speakers for their statements which she explained would be taken into account when the committee considered the respective grant applications.

#### **SE.15** Community grants

The committee received and considered report 57/09 of the Head of Community Strategy which set out details of three applications for community grants and two requests for twinning grants. The report also set out the committee's community grants budget position. It was noted that £8,531 remained in the current financial year.

#### **Twining Partnership Grants**

Councillors Terry Fraser, Jenny Hannaby, and Joyce Hutchinson had each declared a personal interest in this part of the report.

It was reported that the council had service level agreements with the two twinning associations in the south east area, namely the Wantage, Grove and District Twinning Association and the Hendreds Twinning Group. The committee agreed to fund grants of £2,000 to the Wantage and Grove association and £500 to the Hendreds group to meet the service level agreement requirements.

#### **Wantage Street Pastors**

Councillor Zoe Patrick had declared a personal interest in this part of the report.

Councillors commented that there were many different participants involved, all giving up their time for this initiative. The pastors had helped the police to diffuse situations and had undertaken so relatively cheaply. This could reduce the need for police officers to intervene. The council has some responsibility for crime and disorder in the Vale and supporting the pastors was considered a viable project benefiting the community. However, some councillors were concerned that the pastors had to be Christians, albeit that they would help anyone. It was reported that the Pastor's initiative was receiving support in kind from Thames Valley Police, primarily focusing on training. The funding required was for administrative purposes.

It was proposed by Councillor Sue Marchant and seconded by Councillor Jenny Hannaby that a grant of £3,000 should be awarded to the street pastor's initiative. An amendment was proposed by Councillor Richard Farrell and seconded by Councillor Andrew Crawford that a grant of £2,000 should be awarded. This was lost by 6 votes to 4. A further amendment was proposed by Councillor Terry Cox and seconded by Councillor Margaret Turner that a grant of £3,500 should be awarded. This was lost by 7 votes to 3. The committee then voted on the original motion to grant £3,000 and this was carried by 7 votes to nil with 3 abstentions.

#### East Hendred Village Hall

The committee support the application and approved a grant of £500.

#### Wantage Betjeman Festival of Literature and Poetry

Councillor Jenny Hannaby had declared a personal interest in this part of the report.

Many councillors supported this project as the festival would benefit the local area. It was reported that the organiser was well experienced at organising festivals and he was fully committed to a successful outcome. The committee supported that application and agreed an award of  $\mathfrak{L}1,500$ .

### **Community Grants**

#### Recommendations

- (a) that the South East Area Committee notes the budget for community grants in 2011/12 for the South East area of the Vale
- (b) that the committee considers and determines the new applications which have been received and appraised

#### **Purpose of report**

1. The purpose of this report is to set out the budget position for the South East Area Committee in respect of community grants, to invite the committee to consider and determine grant applications.

#### **Relationship with Corporate Plan**

2. The award of grants to community and voluntary sector groups helps to deliver actions set out in the Vale's Sustainable Community Strategy, which aims to improve the quality of life for everyone in the Vale.

#### The community grants budget

- 3. The total budget for community grants for 2011/12 for the Vale is £103,400. This budget is apportioned between the Executive and four area committees. The Executive receives 20% of the budget and the remainder (£82,720) is apportioned according to the electorate in each area on 1 January 2011. The electorate in the South East area on 1 January was 25,964, 27.70% of the Vale's electorate Therefore the budget position for community grants for 2011/12 for the South East area of the Vale is £22,917.
- 4. At its meeting on 7 January 2011 the Executive invited the area committees to meet no more than twice a year, in early April and early October. Therefore, if sufficient budget remains unallocated at the end of this meeting, the area committee will meet again in early October.

#### **New grant applications**

- 5. Applications totalling £34,173 have been received from the applicants listed below. Precises providing additional details are in the appendix to this report.
- 6. Officers have used a scoring system to help in evaluating each application. The scoring system is a fair and transparent way of evaluating how closely a project supports corporate and community strategy priorities, the local need and the amount of funding requested as a percentage of project cost.
- 7. In making the following recommendations officers have also taken into account the available budget. If the following officer recommendations are approved without amendment the total grant awarded will be £9,508.

#### **Comments Section**

#### **Grants Officer:**

Blewbury Village CIC are a newly formed Community Interest Company to undertake the management and activities of the villages new sports pavilion, and has a 25 year lease with Blewbury Parish Council.

Part of the first phase of the £600,000+ pavilion project's planning conditions are to provide landscaping items for the new facility. As a new organisation Blewbury Village CIC currenly have no funds within their bank account. The Parish Council have confirmed financial support in the early years of its operation, including an annual grant of £2,000, payable in two instalments. The organisation have indicated to allow a proportion of this grant going towards these items.

Furniture quotations received show the furniture the organisation is looking to purchase are not commercial, and therefore may not last for as long as they intend. I would be better for the organisation to purchase secured furniture which would ensure it is robust and less prone to vandalism and theft.

The score for this project is based on the overall facilities and activities the Court Hill Centre provides to the public. The organisation is applying for essential maintenance works to ensure the facility is safe for all it users. This includes the replacement of all broken and missing tiles, gutter repairs/replacement, cement repairs to verges, along with other repairs. The total cost of the project including VAT is £4,248. Only one quote has been provided within the application.

The trust made a loss of £31,743 in 2008 and a loss of £9,247 in 2009. The organisation has not supplied account for 2010 and it is unclear on their current finances. The trust did apply for a loan to the council of £5,000 to enable the trust to overcome temporary cash shortages. Clarification on their current bank balances and forecasts need to be provided.

Due to lack of information provided confirming the organisations financial situation it is unclear if the trust can match any grant award.

The trust has applied to the Town Council for a £200 award.
