#### Equalities Officer:

It is well known that the Chinese community face the greatest language barriers and are the Vales largest ethnic minority community. Providing the bilingual surgery will help to ensure that the resident are aware of a number of services provided by the council set out in the bid, that they may be missing out on currently due to lack of confidence, pride and language barriers in approaching the Vale (although we would provide interpreters if requested). The project should therefore improve their quality of life, physical, social and mental well being through the development of the elderly group and bilingual surgery.

In order to ensure that the council receives good value for money, I would recommend that OCCAC meet with the teams they have made reference to in their bids in order to ensure they have the most accurate information to provide to their customers.

#### Grants Officer:

OCCAC are applying for revenue expenditure towards the costs of delivering a new bilingual advice surgery and an elderly group in Abingdon. The organisation is looking to provide this service every 2nd and 4th Wednesday of the month totalling 24 sessions, which will run between 9.30am-4.30pm.

The main costs of the service is for 2 billingual advice workers costing, £8,000 for the year. Other costs include the hiring of a hall, OCCAC coordinator time, volunteer in-kind costs, travelling expenses and office expenses.

It is hard to establish whether these costs are for a one off project or to supplement the organisations ongoing core costs. The total costs of the project is to run these sessions for one year. It is unclear if this is a one off project or a project that will be on-going year on year.

OCCAC at March 2010 made a surplus of £21,538 and held cash in hand of £55,620. The organisation could fund the costs of this project. If this project is on-going, and as the sessions are free for users, there is

no means of meeting the costs of the project, and therefore funding is required to maintain the project and the organisations reserves.

OCCAC have applied to Abingdon Town Council for £4,000 and they are looking to apply to the Big Society Fund to meet the costs of the project.

#### Grants Officer:

This is a small additional project by OCVA (part funded by Oxfordshire County Council) but this additional grant would specifically benefit Abingdon residents. Support for volunteering is one of the organisations key workstream areas.

There are currently 138 volunteering opportunities in the Vale which need filling (predominantly in the Abingdon area), this project would help to facilitate linking volunteers to these opportunities. OCVA would have a meeting area within the Charter in Abingdon to hold meetings with volunteers.

South and Vale Carers' lost their support from Oxfordshire County Council due to the redistribution of funding to the disabled person. Prior to this the organisation was able to offer this service as part of their on-going yearly activities. As a result of this S&V Carers are looking to charge their users for this service, whilst looking to subsidise this cost through grant funding. The centre has been offering this service for over 5 years where they have over 500 carers a year participating in their trips.

The organisation is contributing £650 through its transition fund and have allowed charges for the service to carers of £12,500 for the year. Due to the popularity of this service I am confident that they will maintain a similar number of participation and obtain enough revenue from charging subsidised amounts to carers.

The organisation have had financial support from the following Parish Council's this financial year totalling £2,040 varying from £25 to £250:

The organisation received a yearly grant from OCC of £112,000. This has now been withdrawn and the organisation will need to seek other funding opportunities to maintain their services. The organisation held £328,719 at 31 March 2010 which will help in maintain services in the short term.

The organisation looks to meet the remaining costs from fundraising activities through their fundraising programme, but no information on the sources of funding has been detailed within their application.

Vitalise provide breaks for disabled people based on individual need ensuring their carers can have a rest from their care role, and also to sucure the involvement of volunteers. Although a fee is paid by or on behalf of each guest, Vitalise subsidises this by an average across their 5 centres of £372 per guest week, to make up the shortfall between the actual cost of the break and the fee charged. Last year 6 Vale residents benefited from 14 care break weeks with Vitalise.

Vitalise are looking to subsidise 14 care break costs for Vale residents in 2011/12 amounting £5,208 and one vale resident volunteering with associated costs of £215. They are applying for a grant of 25% of their costs towards providing care breaks/volunteering opportunities for residents in the Vale
